Mandatory Masking Requirement

What is fantasy and what is reality as wacky chaos continues to erupt around him?

Gunshots, Loud Practical and Recorded Sounds

Sudden Light Changes, Strobe Effects

Breakdown:

Please Note: The cue lines listed are spoken three lines before the identified sensory stimuli.

The Actor's Nightmare:

- Strobe Lights (CUE: Voiceover says, "Dr, Crippin will play himself. The management wishes to remind the audience that the taking of flash photography is strictly forbidden by law, and is dangerous as it may disorient the actor. Thank you." Curtain will open and the strobe effect happens on George's entrance.)
- Strobe Lights (CUE: Sarah says, "There. We're not angry anymore.")



- **Practical Sound:** During the "To Be or Not to Be" speech, the actor gets very loud at unexpected times throughout the speech.
- Recorded Sound: Cymbal Crash (CUE: Meg says, "Oh father, if you don't give in to King Henry, they're going to cut off your head!")
- Recorded Sound: Axe Cutting Through Something Wet & Abrupt Blackout (CUE: Ellen says Goodbye Willie.")

Sister Mary Ignatius Explains It All For You:

- Practical Sound: Scream (CUE: Follows the singing of Ave Maria.)
- **Practical Sound:** Hammer Banging (CUE: Virgin Mary says, "Come. Let us go to Golgotha and watch you be crucified.")
- **Practical Sound:** Gunshot: (CUE: Philomena says, "Maybe we should all wait outside.")
- **Practical Sound:** Gunshot (CUE: Sister says " Gary, do you still believe what you and Jeff do is wrong?")
